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K. Course Policies

1. Attendance, Preparation, and Participation:

Attendance & Participation Policy:

You must be on time and participate in class. You must inform the instructor in advance if you will be absent from class. Only severe illness that requires a doctor's visit will be excused. Unexcused absences will result in a zero participation grade for the week.

2. Deadlines:

Generally, assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date assigned, and no late work is accepted. However, after turning a paper in you can rewrite a paper up to three times after receiving feedback in order to improve your score. The rewritten paper's new score will be averaged with the old score. Rewritten papers will only be accepted up to one week after you receive it back.

4. Assignment Options:

You can either email me assignments before the class time that they are due or turn them in typed.

5. Make up work:

Make-up work is not available; however, you can rewrite your work for a better grade up to three times. These rewrites must be turned in within a week of when you receive the original assignment back.

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Incomplete Policy:

All course work is due on the dates assigned. Students who fail to submit assignments on time will be subject to the course's late grading policy. In all other cases and unless otherwise stated by the instructor, all course work is due by 4:00 p.m. on the last day of the semester.

A grade of incomplete will only be awarded to students who cannot physically complete their course work by the last day of the semester due to an avoidable situation such as a serious illness. In such cases, students must provide valid evidence of their condition. After a semester has ended it is no longer possible to request an incomplete. Incompletes will not be granted simply because of poor time management. Students who assume that an incomplete will be issued because they failed to finish their course work by the end of the semester will automatically receive a grade of F.
